

1. The expectation that you will conduct yourself as a professional educator at all times.
2. Like all SOE students, you must receive appropriate scores for not only the teacher education proficiencies but also your Unit dispositions, which are aligned with the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE) standards.

As with any SOE student, if you fail to meet the academic standards and requirements or the general performance expectations in your program, you may be removed from your Student Teaching placement.
